Monday 1 August

Anglican Communion

Diocese of Ekiti Oke (Province of Ondo, Nigeria), Bishop Isaac Olubowale, clergy and people.

Before 1990 the northern two thirds of Nigeria was largely blocked, but eight new bishops were consecrated, paid for by Lagos parishes, and the Project has been highly successful. It is the second largest province in the Anglican Communion, as measured by baptized membership, after the Church of England. Current membership over 25 million, out of a total Nigerian population of 104 million. Since 2002 the Church of Nigeria is organised in 10 ecclesiastical provinces. It has rapidly increased the number of its dioceses and bishops from 91 to 122. There are 3,680 Anglican congregations and 4,000 clergy. The administrative headquarters are in Abuja.

Diocese of El Camino Real (Province of The Episcopal Church) The Rt Revd Mary Gray-Reeves, clergy and people.

Anglicanism was brought to the New World by explorers and colonists with the first celebration of the Holy Eucharist in Jamestown, Virginia, in 1607. There was no resident Bishop for nearly two hundred years, causing problems when many of the clergy sided with the Crown during the American Revolution. In 1784, the Scottish Episcopal Church consecrated the first American Bishop. The Church has 9 Provinces, 98 Dioceses, plus 20 overseas jurisdictions. Out of a population of 284 million, only 2 million are Episcopalians, in 7,095 parishes, with 15,310 clergy.

Iglesia Anglicana de la Region Central de America is one of the newest in the Anglican Communion and is made up of the dioceses of Guatemala, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, and Panama. With the exception of Costa Rica, all had been part of the Episcopal Church of the United States of America. The Church was introduced by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel when England administered two colonies in Central America, Belize (1783-1982) and Miskitia (1740-1894). In later years Afro-Antillean people brought their Anglican Christianity with them. The Province is multicultural and multiracial and is committed to evangelization, social outreach, and community development.

Friday 5 August

Oswald, King, martyr, 605-642

Exiled to Iona at age of ten and was educated there by the monks for eighteen years. Returned to Northumbria as king and won a battle at Hexham defeating Penda of Mercia and his ally Cadwalla of Wales. He brought missionary monks from Iona and Aidan became his bishop and his friend. Oswald often interpreted for Aidan, who was not fluent in English and gave him Holy Island as a refuge. Bede describes Oswald as “a merciful and just king” who promoted peace in the kingdom. He died in battle against Penda of Mercia, aged 38.

The first Kenyan Bishops were consecrated in 1955. The Church became part of the Province of East Africa established in 1960, but by 1970 Kenya was formed into a separate Province. A total population of 30,700,000 with 29 Anglican dioceses.

In the Episcopal Church of The Sudan, out of a total population of 30,120,000 there are 5 million Anglicans and almost three thousand Anglican clergy. The Anglican Church has grown with amazing speed during the period of persecution.

Anglican Communion

The Church of South India (United), Archbishop Dr Govada Dyvasirvadam Moderator of CSI & Bishop of Krishna-Godavari, clergy and people.

The Church was inaugurated in 1947 by the union of the South India United Church (itself a union of Congregational and Presbyterian/Reformed traditions), the southern Anglican diocese of

the Church of India, Burma, Ceylon, and the Methodist Church in South India. It is one of the four United Churches in the Anglican Communion. There are 22 Dioceses.

*Dominic, priest, founder of the Order of Preachers,
1170-1221*

Founder of the Order of Preachers otherwise known as the Dominicans or Black Friars. Dominic was born in Spain and became an Augustinian friar. The Dominicans started as a small band of preachers whose task was to convert the heretical Cathars. Under Simon de Montfort's military crusade the Cathars were put down and the Dominicans developed into a new Order which received official approval in 1217. The movement spread throughout Christendom. (Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican).

Tuesday 9 August

*Mary Sumner founder of the Mothers' Union, 1828-
1921*

The "mother of the Mothers' Union". She was 57 and an Archdeacon's wife when she spoke at a Church Congress in 1885 and called for a new movement for women. Mary travelled all over England (her own children being married and independent) addressing meetings, drafting rules, leaflets and membership cards. By 1892 there were 28 diocesan branches, 1550 branches and over 60,000 members. With Mary Sumner as President and

Queen Victoria as patron it spread to Australia, Canada, India and later to the West Indies, Japan, S America and Africa.

Wednesday 10 August *Laurence, deacon, martyr, 258*

One of the seven deacons of Rome in the time of Pope Sixtus II. Laurence was responsible for the care of church property and for administering alms to the poor. Under the persecution of Valerian, the Pope and four deacons were executed. Laurence, ordered to produce an inventory of Church treasures, for the Emperor, sold sacred vessels and gave the money to the poor, telling the Prefect of Rome "These (the halt, lame, blind) are my treasures". He was executed four days after the Pope. His death on a grid iron, often represented in art, is probably a mediaeval invention. Roman executions were normally by a sword-thrust.

Thursday 11 August *Clare of Assisi, founder of the Poor Clares, 1253*

Clare of Assisi was born into a wealthy family who wanted her to make a dynastic marriage. When she left home in 1212 to start a woman's branch of the Franciscan Order they tried to take her from the nunnery where Francis and his friars had placed her. But her widowed mother, two of her sisters, an aunt and several other women from noble families, formed a small community at San Damiano where Clare was appointed abbess. The pope tried to impose the Benedictine Rule on the nuns but Clare insisted that they, like the friars, must be free to live in poverty and minister to the poor. It was not until 1253 that Pope Innocent III accepted her suggested Rule. They became the first unenclosed Order for women.

Saturday 13 August *Jeremy Taylor, bishop, teacher of the faith, 1613-1667*
Jeremy Taylor, Author of "Holy Living and Holy Dying" and a High Churchman who attracted the attention of Archbishop Laud and became Chaplain to Charles I. After the Civil War he retired to remote livings, first in Wales and later, during the Cromwellian period, in Northern Ireland. Charles II made him Bishop of Down and Connor but the appointment was not a happy one because the RC community treated him as a Protestant whilst the Presbyterians objected to his Romish tendencies. He spent the last years of his life in acute controversy with his chief achievement the rebuilding of the cathedral at Dromore in County Down. Jeremy Taylor was a prolific writer combining theological scholarship with a depth of religious experience in his devotional works.

Anglican Communion The Anglican Church of Southern Africa, Archbishop Dr Thabo Makgoba of Capetown and Primate of Southern Africa, clergy and people.
The Province is the oldest in Africa. British Anglicans met for worship in Cape Town after 1806, with the first Bishop appointed in 1847. The 23 dioceses of the Province extend beyond the Republic of South Africa and include the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (St Helena and Tristan da Cunha), Mozambique (Lebombo and Niassa), the Republic of Namibia, the Kingdom of Lesotho, the Kingdom of Swaziland and Angola. Total population 80,700,000. 28.5 million Christians. 3 million Anglicans with 28 Dioceses, 1,240 clergy, 994 parishes and 1,900 congregations.

Saturday 20 August *Bernard, abbot, teacher of the faith, 1090-1153*
The son of a Crusader, at age of 22 entered the monastery at Citeaux with 39 companions including his brothers and friends. Later, became abbot of a new foundation, Clairvaux, introducing a new and austere rule, which was adapted by many other monasteries reacting to the more lax Benedictine houses in France. Bernard rose to great power and influence. He attacked the monks of Cluny for their worldliness, opposed the teaching of Peter Abelard, preached two Crusades and undertook a mission against the Cathars. He used remarkable invective against his opponents but also preached the faith with such gentleness that he was known as “the honey doctor”. At his death there were more than four hundred Cistercian monasteries in Europe.

It has 9 dioceses for a population of 7,000,000 of whom 5,600,000 are Christians and just over 1,000,000 are Anglicans. There are 197 parishes and 300 clergy.

Tuesday 30 August

John Bunyan, spiritual writer 1628-1688

A Bedfordshire tinker who mended pots, pans and farm implements. His only reading matter was probably the Bible. After his dramatic conversion he joined the Bedford Meeting of Dissenters and after the Restoration (of Charles II) was arrested as “a dangerous and notorious Dissenter”. He refused to give up preaching and was sent to the county gaol where he remained from 1660-1672. During this period he wrote “Grace Abounding” (auto biographical) and part of “Pilgrim’s Progress”. This allegory of Christian’s journey through life, written in the English of the Authorised Version of the Bible, has become a classic of religious writing.

Anglican Communion Diocese of Gambia (Province of West Africa) The Rt Revd James Allen Yaw Odico, clergy and people.
Church of the Province of West Africa includes Cameroon, Ghana, Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone and The Gambia. Total population 45 million of which 10 million are Christians and 1 million are Anglicans with 600 parishes and 450 clergy.

Wednesday 31 August

St Aidan, bishop, missionary 651

Was a monk of Iona, sent to Northumbria by King Oswald who had been an exile on Iona and there taught by Celtic monks. Aidan and Oswald were friends and together worked to evangelise and Oswald gave the Island of Lindisfarne as a place of prayer. Aidan founded churches, monasteries and schools. Lindisfarne was sacked by Vikings in 793

and no visible signs of Aidan's work remains but visitors still find it to be a holy place.
